Introduction

The Care Trust 2014 Annual Report is available on our website: www.thecaretrust.ie. This newsletter contains financial extracts from the 2014 Annual Report (pages 5 and 6) and seeks to give a quick overview of The Care Trust: our Board, how we are governed, how we fundraise, our results for 2014, and some details about our beneficiaries.

Organisational structure and decision making

The Care Trust is governed by the Chairperson and the Board of Directors, who make decisions at Board level regarding strategy in relation to The Care Trust. The Board met 7 times in 2014 (2013: 5). The subcommittee meetings in 2014 were: Audit (1) Governance (3) and Remuneratuion (1). The Directors have appointed a Chief Executive, and the senior management team reports to him. The Directors delegate the day to day operational matters to the Chief Executive and his management team.

Method of appointment of Directors

The Directors are appointed by the shareholders and regulated by provisions of the Memorandum and the Articles of Association of The Care Trust.

Risk management and controls

As a limited company, The Care Trust is subject to annual audit, and the auditor's report for 2014 confirms that the financial statements give a true and fair view and have been properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Acts.

Governance

The Care Trust is compliant with the principles of good governance, as set out in the Corporate Governance Code for Community, Voluntary and Charity Organisations in Ireland and is committed to the standards of the Statement of Guiding Principles for Fundraising issued in the context of the Charities Act 2009. The Care Trust is registered with the Charity Regulatory Authority.

About The Care Trust

Objective

The purpose of The Care Trust is to raise funds for the Central Remedial Clinic (CRC) and for Rehab. By agreement the Company also fundraises for the Mater Misericordiae University Hospital (MMUH).

Who owns The Care Trust?

The Care Trust is owned equally by Rehab and the CRC. The MMUH, in line with its fundraising agreement with The Care Trust, receives a first call on profits up to a maximum of €250k. The balance of disbursed funds is split evenly between the two shareholders.

Strategies for achieving objectives

The Care Trust operates a lottery under licence, granted by the District Court for the benefit of the beneficiaries.

Activities for achieving objectives

The CRC, the MMUH and the Rehab, collectively acting as the promoters, have engaged The Care Trust to operate a lottery for their benefit. The licence in respect of the lottery is held by The Care Trust and the purpose of the lottery is to raise funds for these three charities. The Care Trust runs three car draws each month, for its contributors, who participate by direct debit of €15 per month or through an agent collecting cash at the door.

Contributors can enter into three draws each month, with a Ford Fiesta car to be won in each draw and a number of cash consolation prizes. New contributors are enrolled by fundraisers calling door to door, and contribute by paying $\leqslant 15.00$ via monthly bank mandate.










Today, our contributors participate in regular Draws, three times a month which are operated under licence issued by the district court in accordance with the provisions of the Gaming & Lotteries Act (1956).

Our fundraisers have contributed significant discretionary funding to our beneficiaries that has been a welcome supplement to their core funding from the Department of Health.

The Care Trust contributors sign up to support our beneficiaries by paying \in 15 by monthly direct debit and are

in with a chance to win three Ford Fiestas every month. \leqslant 5 is allocated to each Draw.

Legacy contributors paying less than \in 15 a month, are enterd in the Draws pro rata to their payment. Tickets are issued at 1c so that all monies are utilised in the Draw and eligibility is proportional to the amount paid. Amounts are allocated to each Draw up to \in 5 before being allocated to the next Draw. So a contributor paying \in 12 a month will be entered into 2 Draws at \in 5 and 1 Draw at \in 2.



About the Central Remedial Clinic



In 2014, the CRC appointed a new Board of Directors, a new Chairman in Kieran Timmons and a new Chief Executive in Stephanie Manahan.

The CRC is dedicated to the wellbeing and health of children and adults with physical and multiple disabilities and provides a range of services and supports for people with disabilities, whether they are babies and toddlers, school children, teenagers or adults. It also supports parents, carers and

families. The key aim of the CRC is to help children and adults with disabilities to take responsibility for and have control over their own lives and to set and achieve their own goals.

Each year the CRC provides specialised services to over 4,000 adults and children, mainly through its centre in Clontarf in Dublin, but also from its centres in Waterford and in Limerick.

Real stories, real lives

CRC School A non-denominational and co-educational, special national school in Clontarf for children aged 3-18.

Alan

My name is Alan. I would like to think I'm an advocate for people with disabilities because the Central Remedial Clinic School has given me the confidence to talk to people and be a positive role model for people with disabilities.

I started in the Central Remedial Clinic School when I was four years old. My first teacher was called Mandy. She was very nice to me. I played Joseph in the school nativity play and I made my Holy Communion and Confirmation with my class.

I have met a couple of famous people through the years. One of them was the Minister for Education and Skills at the time, Mary Hanafin. I also met the former president of Ireland, Mary Mc Aleese.

Just because I'm a wheelchair user, it doesn't mean I can't take part in activities. I like swimming and wheelchair hurling. Even though I can't hold a hurl, I still participate. We won the Peter Newman hurling trophy four times.

As I moved up the school I could feel myself getting more capable of doing more challenging work. I sat my Junior Certificate exams and I passed with flying colours. I got two honours, in Music and Civic, Social and Political Education. I was very happy with the outcome of my exams. The teachers and special needs assistants in my school are very supportive.

I know I'm in a safe environment when I'm in the Central Remedial Clinic.

Danny

My name is Danny. I am a service user in the Training & Development Centre in Clontarf.

I have a key worker who helps me with my person centred plan (PCP). A person centred plan is a way of discovering how a person wants to live their life and what is needed to make that possible.

One of my big goals was to get a job, so I did a FETAC Level 3 Vocational Training Course in my centre, and then the staff helped me to get a part-time job.

I am on the Advocacy Committee and we do advocacy training to help us to speak up for ourselves.

The CRC has really helped me to be more independent and to be a more confident person so that I can make my own choices and be in charge of my life.





About Rehab

The Rehab Group is an independent international group of charities and commercial companies which works towards a world where every person has the opportunity to achieve their potential. Rehab works in local communities to provide high-quality services and opportunities to people who need them.

Over 3,500 Rehab staff provide health and social care, training and education, and rehabilitation, employment and commercial services in Ireland, England, Scotland, Wales, the Netherlands, Poland and Saudi Arabia. These services enhance the quality of people's lives, by supporting people in fulfilling personal goals, in accessing new opportunities and in playing a more active role in their communities. Rehab enables people to make the most of their skills and talents, to take up employment or further education and to live more independent lives.

In Ireland, **Rehab will train 5,000 people**, many of whom require additional supports, and set them on the path to further education, training and employment. Almost **500** people are placed in jobs each year and Rehab continues to **support**

some 200 people who use its services in part-time employment, while directly employing a further 300 people with disabilities in its commercial division.

The people who currently use Rehab services include young people and adults with physical, sensory and intellectual disabilities, people with mental health difficulties, people with autism and people with an acquired brain injury. In Ireland, Rehab's services are provided through RehabCare, National Learning Network and Rehab Enterprises. Services in the UK are co-ordinated by TBG Learning, Momentum and The Chaseley Trust.

RehabCare delivers health and social care services which reach into communities the length and breadth of Ireland. Each year, more than 3,000 people of all ages and from all walks of life avail of our resource centres, residential and respite care, supported accommodation, outreach and home-based services.

National Learning Network

National Learning Network provides high-quality training, education and employment placement services which

successfully support over 90% of its 5,000 students in progressing to further education or employment every year. Courses are delivered in 50 locations around Ireland and include more than 40 programmes ranging from business studies and computer skills, to photography and performing arts.

Rehab Enterprises

Rehab Enterprises is Ireland's largest single non-government employer of people with disabilities, operating a unique integrated employment policy. Over 400 people are employed by Rehab Enterprises, more than half of whom are people with disabilities, in businesses ranging from recycling to retail services.

About the Mater Misericordiae University Hospital





The Mater Misericordiae University Hospital is a charitable voluntary hospital and holds a unique place in the delivery of healthcare not only as the main charitable and voluntary general hospital serving Dublin's north inner city, but also providing healthcare to the rest of the country with its national and tertiary services.

The Mater Misericordiae University Hospital is a major teaching hospital, based at Eccles Street, Phibsboro, on the northside of Dublin, Ireland. Mater Misericordiae means "mother of mercy" in Latin and alludes to its founders, the Sisters of Mercy.

The Hospital was founded by the Sisters of Mercy in 1861 and opened on September 24th 1861.

It is a university teaching hospital providing acute and tertiary specialist services.

The Mater Misericordiae University Hospital has approximately 600 beds (at full capacity) including day beds.

Cardiac surgery
Heart and Lung Transplantation
Extra Corporeal Life Support (ECLS)
Spinal Injuries
Pulmonary hypertension
National Isolation Unit
Bone Anchored Hearing Aid



Mater Misericordiae University Hospital

The Mater Hospital is a tertiary referral centre for cardiothoracic surgery as well as housing the National Spinal injuries unit. It also houses the national heart and lung transplant programme. The National Pulmonary Hypertension Unit is also the leading centre in this area in Ireland. It also is a major centre for cardiology offering the only 24 hour, 365 days per year interventional cardiology service in the country.

It is associated with the National University of Ireland (University College Dublin School of Medicine) and provides national tertiary care in many branches of medicine.

The first endoscope was used in the Mater. The hospital is mentioned by Buck Mulligan in James Joyce's Ulysses.


